I tried to take care of my men the way Willy and Joe would have liked me to. Since I had made it to PFC before I became a 2Lt, I identified with my men. At the end of my tour, I was the field XO of C Co and was the only officer at NDP Knight.

Recently researching the 39th, I'm pretty sure the men of the 39th who participated in the three invasions of Italy probably served beside Willy and Joe. I also learned from Mike Male and Marty Walsh that the 39th, who initially went over on the LST and troop ship, were also some of the first ground combat troops in Vietnam. It makes me proud to follow in the footsteps of such fine men.

REUNION 2025 INFO

We are ready to start taking reservations for the 2025 Reunion in Metairie, LA. Please click on the booking link at the end of this article or call **504-837-6707**. Be sure to let them know you are with the **39th Engineer** Battalion Alumni Association. We have a block of room set aside with the discounted rate of \$139.00 per **night** (plus state and local taxes). This price includes breakfast for two each morning. The deadline for making reservations is August 15th. However, don't wait! If something comes up, you can cancel your reservations up to 48 hours before the beginning of the reunion (September 15th). Yes, we know there are some cheaper motels you could find to stay at. However, these discounted rates, rooms booked, and concessions negotiated are based on the requirement that we book at least 40 rooms per night. That way, we don't have to pay for our Hospitality Room or any meeting rooms we need. Besides, it makes more sense to stay in the same hotel with the reason you're coming to the reunion – be with your buddies and their families. PLEASE call or book as soon as possible.

There are two types of guest rooms: Two double beds, or One king size bed.

Each room has a workstation with a stationary and a moveable work desk, a task lamp and ergonomic chair, and complimentary high-speed wireless connection. There is a coffee maker and microwave in each room in addition to the flat panel television with cable and pay-per-view movies, clock radio, hair dryer and iron with full-size ironing board.

If you require a handicap room, please call the Hotel directly at 504-837-6707 to let them know of your needs.

Please remember: If you have the need for special accommodations such as handicap accessibility, it is your responsibility to take care of that with the hotel when you make your

reservations; we can't do that for you.

If you plan on driving, there is **free parking** at the hotel. If you plan to fly, there is an **airport shuttle** for the hotel.

As has been the custom in previous years, we will be holding our **Meet and Greet** on the first night (Wednesday) with Pizza and Salad.

For Thursday and Friday night, the hotel has a restaurant and bar. There is also a pool, spa, and Fitness Center if you're so inclined.

On Thursday, we plan to start our tour with a visit to the World War II Museum. You could spend two days looking at everything, but we're going to be there from 9:00 am – 1:30 pm. Then, we go to the Destrehan Plantation until 3:30 pm and we board the motorcoach for the trip back to the hotel.

Friday is a FREE DAY to visit attractions on your own. You could go back to the WII Museum or take an Air Boat Ride in the swamp. There is also an aquarium close to the WWII Museum. Of course, they have cemetery tours (the cemeteries are above ground).

Our last full day will be Saturday, with our **General Meeting** in the morning at 10:00 am. Everyone is invited. Our Banquet will be Saturday night. Check the registration in this newsletter for your food options.

Please consider bringing something to donate to the **Silent Auction**. Winners will be announced after the Banquet on Saturday night. All the items will be on display in the Hospitality Room during our reunion.

We need you to sign up as soon as possible. You can always cancel before the event, but we need to get at least 40 rooms booked to meet our contract obligations.



Fort Moore is an impressive facility, now named after Lieutenant General Harold Moore and his wife Julia. It is the only installation named after a husband/ wife couple as Mrs. Moore was very active in military issues.

This is a large and distinguished Army base, and of major interest is the National Infantry Museum located on post.

After an engrossing day of exploring, we headed home to Stone Mountain. The drive on I-85 was a bit boring, so we opted to follow the backroads for more interesting views. And that is where "serendipity" took over – Our daughter, born while I was serving in Vietnam, has been considering having a special quilt made using fabric from shirts worn by her two children that had special meaning. Passing through the small town of Hogansville, Beverly happened to see the sign for Hometown Quilt Shop – and we stopped. There we met Penny Willingham and Cindy Foley. Hometown Quilt Shop is a very nicely appointed business with many interesting decorations. But without a doubt, the most intriguing feature is the "military wall" honoring not just owner Penny Willingham's family, but all military members.

He served 9 years in the U.S. Army

and received the Purple Heart, Bronze Star, U.S. Army Commendation Medal, Good Conduct Medal, and many other honors. One of his highest honors was to stand guard at the funeral procession of Pres. John F. Kennedy, Jr. in Washington, D.C. He was proud American and served his country and God faithfully.

Out of the military, Joe worked first at Masonite in the chipper dept., then at Amerada Hess as a diesel mechanic in Laurel until he retired. Joe and his wife Barbara raised chickens for 23 years for Sanderson Farms. Once retired, he worked part-time as a truck driver for Walters Construction and RJ Walters Trucking.

Joe was an active member of Freedom Baptist Church in Myrick, MS. He loved fishing, hunting deer and squirrels, mostly. He was an avid farmer and gardener. He shared his crops with anyone.
